Equipment & safety

Weather preparedness

The weather is warming up and vegetation may be getting thick! Now is the time to consider your site access and overall safety, ensuring that you check sites regularly before scheduling activities.

SAFETY SPOTLIGHT: Spring considerations

Vegetation can cover some areas of roadsides. Always conduct a pre-clean site assessment ensuring:

- Safe and easy site access for the entirety of the site and all volunteer abilities.
- Consider contacting your local authority for mowing/pruning if you cannot access some areas.
- Consider what critters may be living in and around the site and ensure that you discuss risk management with your group pre-clean.
- Always have an appropriate first aid kit accessible. Now might be the time to update kits to include snake bandages and burn gels.
- Ensure that you wear weather and site appropriate clothing and protection. This may include hats with neck coverage if possible, sunglasses/goggles, long sleeves shirts and pants and of course sturdy and safe footwear. Match this with your Road Watch equipment for a safe and enjoyable clean up activity (Pickers, tongs, high-visibility vests).
